2017 NVOC Job Fair



North Valley Occupational Center hosted its Annual Job and Resource Fair on April 28, 2017 from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. It was another successful event with 84 employers from all over the North East San Fernando Valley region who participated. NVOC's cul-desac was buzzing with students and people from the community as they interacted with the numerous professional agencies and business representatives. This year, there was a large business presence from the Aviation and Machining industries. An estimated number of 2,000 people attended the job fair and approximately 700 jobs were available and potentially offered to job seekers last Friday at the event.

Much of the success of the job fair can be attributed to the strong and generous support from our local legislators, LAUSD Board, LA City and the Division of Adult and Career Education. The Office of Assembly Member Raul Bocanegra graciously sent out 27,000 mailers inviting residents within the neighboring zip codes to attend.

The Job Fair was kicked off by inspirational words and motivational messages from Assembly Member Raul Bocanegra, Assembly District 39, Ms. Diana Sanchez, Van Nuys Airport Public and Community Relations Director, Ms. Ruby Chavez, Chief of Staff for LAUSD Board Member Monica Ratliff District 6, and Ms. Ambrosia Solis, Community Affairs Deputy for LAUSD Board Member Scott Schmerelson District 3. It was an honor to have these special guests drop by NVOC's Job Fair and experience the positive energy generated by the event.

Community College Summer Course at NVOC

In partnership with Los Angeles Mission Community College, through the Los Angeles Regional Adult Education Consortium.



North Valley Occupational Center will be offering the Counseling Success Seminar 40 course (3 units UC:CSU transferable) this summer at the NVOC campus M-Th, 8:00-10:30AM June 12-July 13, 2017. This course is a fantastic opportunity for adult and AC2T students to earn their first 3 units of college credit towards their Associates in Arts degree at their own adult school campus! The course will explore issues related to higher education that impact student success. Topics will include an overview of academic skills, college student policies and procedures, educational planning, career development, and self-assessment techniques. A perfect orientation course to college life! There is no college entrance exam required or prerequisites to take this course.

To start the registration process, simply visit the counseling office to complete a brief enrollment form. You will need to also fill out the college online application for college admission to generate your college student ID number. The adult school Advisors or the visiting college outreach counselor can assist you if you need help. The deadline to register is Friday, May 12th for this summer course. NVOC Student Fieldtrip to LAMCC



On Tuesday, April 25, 2017 students from North Valley attended a fieldtrip to LA Mission College. Although most students were picked up by a bus provided curtesy of LA Mission, others met the group at the college. Approximately 46 students participated in the event that included a walking tour, presentations from college staff regarding special programs and services, and registration for the LA Promise Program. Students met with and had the opportunity to speak to both the Dean of Student Success, Carlos Gonzalez and Dr. Larry Resendez, Associate Dean of DSPS who made time to also Student presenters present about programs they supervise. provided information about their experiences as well. student were treated to lunch and provides snacks during their visit from 8:00AM-2:00PM.

LA Mission College will be providing another bus, for these same students and other eligible adult students to return to Mission on May 3, 2017 to take the Accuplacer (college entrance exam) and meet individually with college counselors to review their placement results, receive priority registration for summer and fall classes, and establish their Comprehensive-Student Educational Plan (C-SEP).

Not only was this fieldtrip a great experience to orientate our adult students to the community college, all students participants will also satisfy the three required components for entry into the LACCD system. These components are Orientation (O), Assessment (A), and Counseling (C). By completing these three required components and establishing their C-SEP, our adult students are in compliance with what the community college requires to secure priority registration for classes. An event such as this is a wonderful example of LARAEC partnership collaboration and provides a model transition DACE students into the community college

Appropriate Personal Necessity (PN) Usage

Please review the following on the appropriate usage of Personal Necessity (PN) code absence. Personal Necessity (PN) is a time code used to report absence(s) of an employee due to any of the following reasons as specified in the applicable Collective Bargaining Unit Agreement, Personnel Commission Rules or Board Rules.

- Death of a close friend or relative not included in the definition of immediate family.
- Death or serious illness of a member of the employee's immediate family. Immediate family is defined as the employee's: Spouse, cohabitant Parent (includes in-law, step and foster), parent of cohabitant, Grandparent (includes in-law and step), grandparent of Cohabitant Child (includes son/daughter-in-law, step and foster), child of cohabitant, Grandchild (includes grandchild of spouse and step grandchild), grandchild of cohabitant, sibling, or a relative living in the employee's immediate household
- Accident involving the employee's person or property or the person or property of a member of the employee's immediate family.
- Birth of a child of the employee.
- Religious holiday of the employee's faith. ***
- Imminent danger to the home of the employee occasioned by a disaster such as flood, fire or earthquake.
- Appearance in court as a litigant, or appearance in court or governmental agency as a non-litigant witness under subpoena.***
- Attendance at a conference or convention which does not qualify as miscellaneous absence under the various Collective Bargaining Unit Agreements. ***
- Up to two hours for verifiable automobile failure if the employee's automobile is required to be used for work purposes on that day (applicable to classified employees only).
- Up to one day a year for verifiable registration or final examinations at a District-recognized institution of higher learning (applicable to classified employees only).
- Required attendance in the classroom of the employee's child or ward or a meeting with the school administrator because of the child's or ward's suspension.
- Adoption of a child by the employee (including child of cohabitant).
- Up to four hours of personal necessity leave and up to 36 hours of accrued vacation or unpaid leave not to exceed a total of eight (8) hours per calendar month or 40 hours per school year for each child or ward of the employee in kindergarten or grades 1 to 12 to visit the child's or ward's school provided under 230.8 of the Labor Code.

Note: ***Five (5) days advance notice is required.
